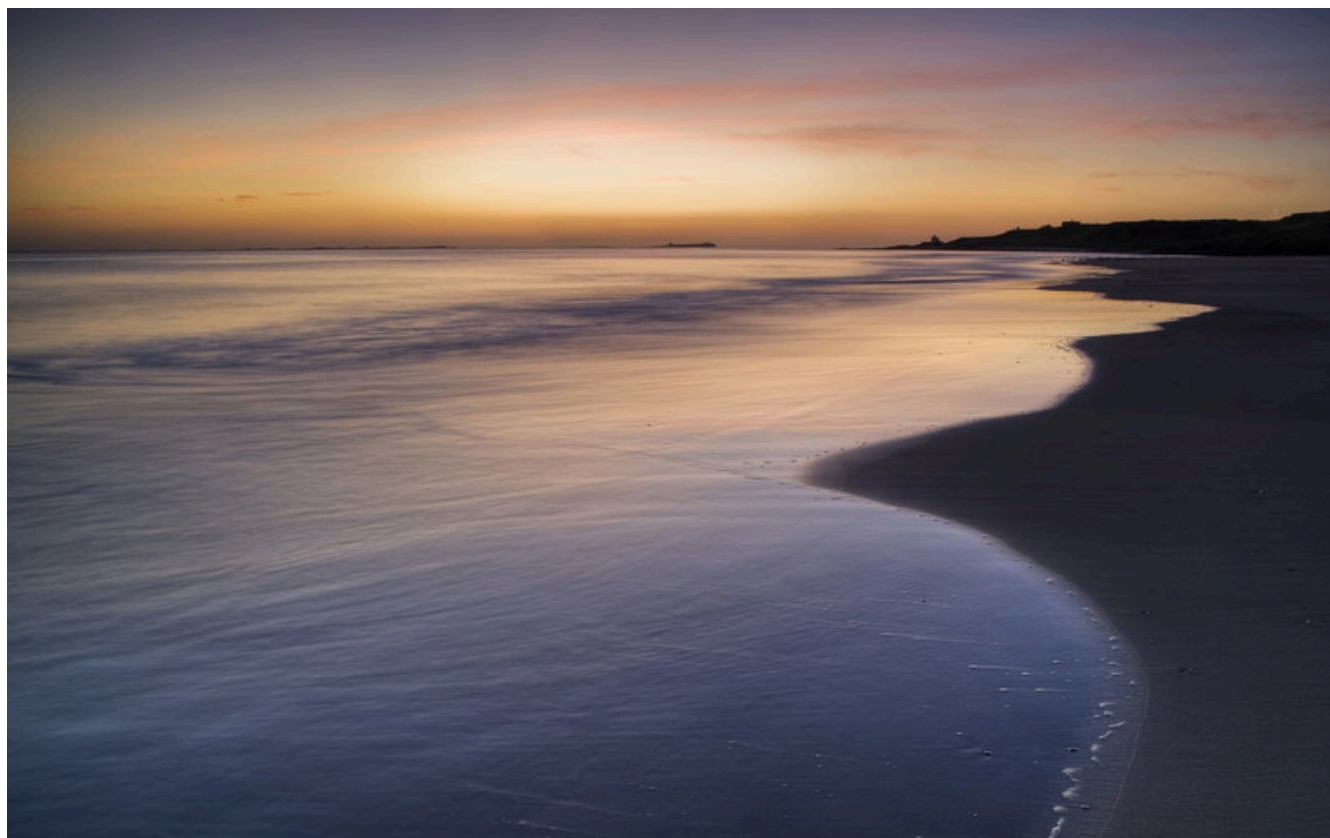

Holiday Overview

A land of rugged beauty, Northumberland rewards with marshes, meadows, sweeping beaches, wide-open spaces, and all manner of Roman, Viking and Anglo-Saxon relics. Perfect for discovering the county's charms at a more relaxed pace, this holiday rewards with breathtaking trails, big-name historic attractions, picturesque villages, market towns, comfortable accommodation, and more. You'll also enjoy a choice of up to three different-grade daily walks, including a gentle walk of three to four miles.

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Day 1 Arrival Day

Check-in at the hotel is available from 16:00. If you are a member you can arrive at the house from 14:00. Enjoy a complimentary cream tea at 16:30 and meet other guests.

Day 2 Rothbury

Option 1 – The Coquet Valley

Distance: 7 miles (11.5km)

Ascent: 1,100 feet (350m)

In summary: From Rothbury main car park the walk ascends to reach the Hamlet of Whitton and then continues below the Simonside hills to visit the hamlet of Great Tosson. After descending and crossing the Coquet Valley there is an ascent up to Rothbury Terraces before returning to Rothbury.

Highlight: Views of the Coquet Valley from both sides and the hamlet of Great Tosson with its mediaeval remains and nearby Lime Kiln.

Option 2 – Coquet Valley and Riverside

Distance : 5.5 miles (9 km)

Total Ascent: 550 feet (170 m)

In Summary: A circular route starting in the pretty market town of Rothbury. We head out past the Iron Age hill fort of West Hills. Little evidence of the fort remains, but the location affords lovely views of the Coquet valley. From there we descend into the village of Thorpton, where we cross the River Coquet to reach Tosson Lime Kiln. We continue along the valley bottom with views of Simonside above us and the Rothbury Terraces opposite, before crossing back over the river to reach Rothbury once more.

Highlight: the Coquet valley offers a great diversity of birdlife – see what you can spot enroute.

Option 3 – Thropton to Rothbury

Distance : 3.7 miles (6 km)

Total Ascent: 240 feet (75 m)

In Summary: We leave the village of Thropton, cross the River Coquet and fields of the Coquet Valley to reach Tosson Lime Kiln. We continue along the valley bottom with views of Simonside above us and the Rothbury Terraces opposite, crossing back over the river to reach the quiet town of Rothbury

Highlight: Views of the Coquet Valley, the surrounding hills and the peacefulness of the countryside setting.

Day 3 Along the Northumberland Coast

Option 1 – Beadnell to Craster

Distance: 7.5 miles (12km)

Ascent: 350 feet (120m)

In summary: Starting further north at Beadnell this grand coastal walk takes in the sweeping arcs of Beadnell and Embleton Bays, the pretty National Trust village Low Newton-by-the-Sea and atmospheric Dunstanburgh Castle before finishing in Craster.

Highlight: A glorious opportunity to see the best of the Northumberland Coast. With luck you may see seals, as well as the rich array of birdlife.

Option 2 – High Newton to Craster

Distance: 5.5 miles (8.5km)

Ascent: 290 feet (90m)

In summary: Walk from High Newton via Embleton Bay to the iconic ruins of Dunstanburgh Castle, then follow the path along the beautiful Northumberland Coast to the pretty fishing village of Craster

Highlight: Dunstanburgh Castle occupies a glorious cliff-top position. Look out for fulmars, razorbills and kittiwakes nesting nearby.

Option 3 – Craster and Dunstanburgh

Distance : 3 miles (4.5 km)

Total Ascent: 130 feet (40m)

In Summary: Explore the picturesque village of Craster, before enjoying an out and back walk to the dramatic ruins of Dunstanburgh Castle, perched on a remote headland. The route was recently voted the most impressive in the UK.

We haven't included the entrance fees for the castle as many of you are already English Heritage members – please bring your membership card with you for free access to the castle. For anyone not an English Heritage member, entrance will be payable locally. If you don't wish to visit the castle, bring your binoculars and enjoy time watching the birdlife as others explore.

We return to Alnmouth where you're free to spend the afternoon exploring independently or relaxing at Nether Grange. Alternatively, our coach can drop you at Howick Hall & Gardens (entrance payable locally) – the ancestral home of Earl Grey, where there's beautiful gardens and an arboretum to explore. There's also a café where there's a good chance of spotting red squirrels on their feeders outside. The coach will then return for you later in the day

Highlight: Snapping shots of Dunstanburgh Castle perched on the headland.

Day 4 Free Day – Northumberland

Day 5 Amble and Warkworth

Option 1 – Amble to Warkworth

Distance: 3.5 miles (6 km)

Ascent: 200 feet (60m)

In summary: Explore Amble and admire the views out to Coquet island, before we begin our walk today. There's a fabulous range of craft shops in the pastel-painted beach huts on the front, or discover the range of fish caught locally at the Northumberland Seafood Centre. We pass through the marina and along the estuary, a great place for spotting birdlife, and follow the River Coquet to the historic village of Warkworth with its castle, hermitage, riverside walks, coffee shops, and far too tasty – chocolate shop!

Highlight: The Amble harbour boardwalk gives spectacular views of Coquet Island seabird sanctuary.

Option 2 – Low Hauxley to Warkworth

Distance: 6 miles (10km)

Total ascent: 560 feet (170m)

In summary: From Northumberland Wildlife Trust's nature reserve at Hauxley, this a varied coastal walk via the harbour at Amble to historic Warkworth and it's medieval castle perched high above the River Coquet.

Highlight: Spend time in Warkworth at the end of the walk, a picturesque coastal village steeped in history.

Option 3 - Warkworth to Alnmouth via Lesbury

Distance: 7.5 miles (12.5km)

Ascent: 490 feet (150m)

In summary: Starting in historic Warkworth with its medieval castle, follow in the footsteps of St Oswald along the coast to Alnmouth.

Highlight: Enjoy a blend of natural beauty, historical landmarks, and coastal charm.

Day 6 Explore Alnwick

Option 1 - Ramble to Alnwick

Distance: 6 miles (9.5km)

Ascent: 540 feet (165m)

In summary: Starting from Denwick this walk passes through the Northumberland Estates belonging to the Dukes of Northumberland. There are varying landscapes from the Pastures below the Castle, the Deer Park to moorland west of the town.

Highlight: This walk shows the different aspects of Alnwick including views of the Castle from the Pastures, Alnwick Abbey in Hulne Park, Alnwick Moor and the town itself.

Option 2 - Along the Aln to Alnwick

Distance: 8 miles (13km)

Ascent: 600 feet (185m)

In summary: Starting from Nether Grange House this walk skirts the River Aln salt marsh teeming with wildlife, then passes through historic Lesbury to follow the Aln through the Northumberland Estates to reach Alnwick.

Highlight: The spectacular view of Alnwick Castle from The Pastures in the Northumberland Estate before reaching the iconic Lion Bridge

Option 3 - Alnwick

Distance : 3 miles (5 km)

Total Ascent: 285 feet (85 m)

In Summary: This walk begins at Alnwick Gardens with the unique Treehouse Restaurant visible through the trees. We'll descend to the Denwick Bridge and walk over pastures, accompanied by iconic views of Alnwick Castle. We visit the entrance to Hulne Park and then pass through Pottergate, past the statue of Harry Hotspur to reach Alnwick Market place. We'll finish the walk by heading through Bondgate back to Alnwick Gardens.

Highlight: Fabulous views of Alnwick Castle and the chance to enter and leave the town through the old town gates.

Day 7 Bamburgh

Option 1 - Beadnell to Bamburgh

Distance: 6.5 miles (10.5m)

Total ascent: 250 feet (80m)

In summary: Enjoy an iconic beach walk from Beadnell to Seahouses with time to look at the harbour then it's on to Bamburgh and its castle.

Highlight: Look out for seabirds and seals flying and bobbing about amongst the waves on this excellent coastal walk.

Option 2 - Budle Bay to Bamburgh

Distance: 3.5 miles (5.5km)

Ascent: 130 feet (40m)

In summary: We head out to the coast along gently sloping paths with views of Budle Bay appearing and reappearing through the frames of huge dunes. Eventually reaching Bamburgh.

Highlight: If the tide is waning, keep your eyes peeled for a myriad of wading birds in Budle Bay, including oystercatcher, curlew and turnstone sifting through the sand and silt and rocks for their next meal.

Option 3 - Seahouses to Bamburgh

Distance: 4 miles (6.5km)

Ascent: 195 feet (60m)

In summary: We've a superb beach walk in store for you, from Seahouses to Bamburgh. Our entrance to Bamburgh shows the namesake Castle in its full glory and offers a great photo opportunity. When we reach Bamburgh there's time to explore independently – spend time on the beach, explore the shops, pubs and cafes, take time to visit one or two of the following – the castle, the walled gardens, the lifeboat museum, or the crypt and find out more about the Bamburgh Bones!

Highlight: Bamburgh Castle appearing ahead of us sat framed by the dunes

Day 8 Departure Day

Enjoy a leisurely breakfast before making your way home.

Daily Walk Options



Easier Walks

Walk at a relaxed pace, often spending time at places of interest en-route. Walking experience isn't necessary as distances are quite short and gradients generally easy.

Accommodation

Nether Grange

You can tell that you're in for something special at this former 18th century granary in the heart of Alnmouth – the postcard-pretty coastal village treasured for its colourful cottages, superb walking routes, and peaceful beach where the River Aln meets the North Sea (in its heyday, it was a working river-port, exporting grain, wool, coal, and even the odd pipe of Madeira wine). Not only will you be a 40-minute drive from Northumberland National Park, but also within easy travelling distance of several visit-worthy castles, including Alnwick, Lindisfarne, Dunstanburgh, and Warkworth. If the weather's nice, a boat trip to the Farne Islands that lie just offshore midway between the villages of Seahouses and Bamburgh rewards with sightings of England's largest grey seal colonies.

A warm welcome

We want you to feel comfortable from the moment you arrive. Evening entertainment

Walks talks

Our HF Holidays walk leaders host guided walking information briefings before dinner on guided walking holiday arrival days. This is followed by a group Walks Talk for information on the following day's guided walks (held before dinner every evening). Self-guided walking guests are, of course, welcome.

The walking day

Prior to setting off on guided walks, your HF Holidays Leader will run you through a short safety briefing. There's also an up-to-date weather forecast on display at the house to ensure you have appropriate clothing and footwear. If you choose to do your own walks or are on a self-guided walking holiday, we ask that you please complete an Independent Walker Card each day. By train

The nearest station is Alnmouth, on the main east coast line between Newcastle and Edinburgh.

The station is 1.3 miles from Nether Grange. Approximately 30 minutes walk, with footpath all the way.

Check National Rail for train times and routes.

By taxi

The 1.5-mile journey from Alnmouth railway station to Nether Grange is about five minutes by taxi. Taxis are in limited supply in Alnmouth, so we recommend pre-booking as early as possible.

Some taxi companies have school runs so taxis may be in short supply between 9:00am and 10:00am. It is advisable to book your return taxi when you book your arrival taxi.

By car

Before travelling by car, note that there is no car park at Nether Grange and there's very limited on-street parking.

Exit the A1 onto the A1068 towards Alnwick. At the roundabout turn right (it's not well signposted), following the A1068 towards Alnmouth. Go straight ahead at the first roundabout then left at the second roundabout onto the B1338.

As you approach Alnmouth, turn right at the next roundabout, then left into The Wynd. Follow to Marine Road, turn right onto Riverside Rd which joins to Northumberland Street. After 100 yards on Northumberland St, turn right into Pease's Lane. You'll find Nether Grange on the left.

By air

The nearest airport is Newcastle International Airport. Take the metro to Newcastle Central station, then the train to Alnmouth – a straightforward journey taking just over an hour.

Local Area

Whether you're enjoying a guided or self-guided walking holiday, there's always the opportunity to linger for longer. Here's our pick of the very best things to see and do within easy travelling distance of Nether Grange.

Alnmouth

This pretty coastal village is adored for its colourful cottages, superb walking routes, peaceful bays, and deserted sandy beaches where the River Aln meets the North Sea. There's a small tidal harbour, a handful of small shops, and several pubs and cafés.

Alnwick Castle

A 15-minute drive away, the market town of Alnwick is dominated by the second-largest inhabited castle in the country. Home to the Duke of Northumberland's family for over 700 years, it has featured in *Harry Potter* films and *Downton Abbey* specials.

Alnwick Gardens

The castle's 12-acre garden is home to a collection of over 4,000 plant varieties. Highlights include the world's largest Tai Haku Cherry Orchard, a cascade comprising of 120 water jets, and the world's largest treehouse restaurant set 18 metres above ground level.

Bamburgh Castle

Home of the Armstrong family since 1894 and crowning nine acres of the Great Whin Sill, this so-called king of castles has stood guard above the Northumberland coast for thousands of years. The site is by the seaside village of Bamburgh, a 35-minute drive away.

Farne Islands

Located off Northumberland's coast in the North Sea, this groups of islands is home to a breeding colony of thousands of seabirds and grey seals. Between March and October, regular boat trips run from Seahouses harbour – a 45-minute drive away.

Lindisfarne (Holy Island)

An hour's drive away, this sacred place is where you can follow in the footsteps of the ancient monks who built their priory here nearly 1,400 years ago. Don't miss the museum for a chance to learn more about the 8th century manuscript known as the Lindisfarne Gospels.

Warkworth Castle

Crowning the hilltop above the River Coquet, Northumberland's hilltop fortress and hermitage was used by William Shakespeare as the setting for several scenes of his *Henry IV* plays. Located in the village of Warkworth, it's just a 10-minute drive away.

Cragside House

A 40-minute drive away, this National Trust-owned house was the first in the world to be lit by hydroelectric power. Highlights include one the largest rock gardens in Europe, a rhododendron-filled garden, and over 40 miles of lovely lakeside and woodland walks.

Seaton Delaval Hall

Designed by acclaimed Baroque architect, Sir John Vanbrugh, this National Trust-owned mansion is a 40-minute drive away. The grounds are gorgeous, especially the formal rose garden that was created in the 1950s and 1960s by Lady Hastings.

Hadrian's Wall

A 90-minute drive away, this World Heritage Site built in AD 122 extends for 73 miles. Don't miss the Roman Vindolanda Fort & Museum for fascinating artefacts, reconstructed turrets and temples, and insight of daily life in a Roman garrison town.

Edinburgh

Scotland's capital is just a one-hour train ride from Alnmouth station and worth the effort for its wealth of attractions. Must-dos include visiting Edinburgh Castle, spending time at the National Museum of Scotland, climbing Arthur's Seat, and strolling through Holyrood Park.

Newcastle-Upon-Tyne

Simply known as Newcastle, this vibrant city is an hour's drive away. Highlights include admiring the iconic Tyne Bridge, relaxing at Newcastle City Baths, crossing the Gateshead Millennium Bridge, and visiting Gateshead's Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art.

Useful Holiday Information

The UK has a famously unpredictable climate so it's best to be prepared for weather that's sunny one minute and raining the next. To make it easier, here's a list of items you should consider packing.

Essentials

- Suitable footwear such as waterproof walking boots that provide ankle support and good grip
- Waterproof and windproof jacket
- Comfortable clothing (jeans & waterproof capes are not suitable)
- Mid-layer(s) to keep you warm. Fleeces make a good choice
- Waterproof overtrousers
- Gloves and a warm hat
- Rucksack with waterproof liner
- Flask for hot drinks
- Water bottle (at least 1 litre capacity)
- Sunscreen
- UV sunglasses

For holidays operating October through to the end of March, please also bring the following on your walks:

- spare warm clothing
- spare high energy food
- head torch and spare batteries
- please note for the October to March season your waterproof jacket needs to offer a high level of waterproofing and wind resistance, and a hood. Look for a waterproof jacket with sealed/taped seams and a minimum HH (hydrostatic head - this is the rating given on waterproof jackets) of 10,000mm+

Recommended

- Several base layers (long-sleeve or short-sleeve)
- Cushioned walking socks to avoid blisters
- First aid kit, including plasters and insect repellent and tick remover tool
- Sit mat
- Waterproof pouch for valuables
- Rubbish bag (remember to always leave no trace)
- Wallet/purse
- Camera
- Walking poles

Trip Information

Walks may be changed for safety reasons and are subject to a maximum and minimum number of guests.

Leaders always consider the safety of the group as a whole, and may need to alter or curtail the walk if the conditions dictate. Your leader may refuse to accept a guest where clothing, equipment or behaviour is unsuitable. In the event of a problem all leaders carry a mobile phone, first aid kit, group shelter, spare maps and a compass.

Please note: If you choose to leave the group your leader is no longer responsible for you.

If you have a particular health condition or disability please put this on your guest registration form. This information will be confidential to your leaders and the house manager, but leaders do need to take account of any issues when planning walks. Please carry a copy of these trip notes with you, or note down the contact phone number for your accommodation (details in the travel section) should you need them in case of emergency.
